Masaryk university

Masaryk university (MU) is the second largest university in the Czech Republic (10 faculties) with more than 100 years of history. The Faculty of Medicine (FM) is one of the four founding faculties of Masaryk University. Since its foundation, over 22,000 doctors, 3,000 non-medical professionals and 3,000 stomatologists have been educated in 18 study programmes. The Faculty is open to talented high school students through the MU Faculty of Medicine Junior Academy.

Scientific research activities occur in more than 70 departments, and 19 research groups are active here. More than 700 articles are produced annually at the Faculty. More than 4200 students are taught at 16 theoretical institutes, four professional and 48 clinical departments. It is currently educating new generations of physicians and non-medical health professionals in three Master's programmes, ten Bachelor's and five linked Master's degree programmes. The Faculty also offers studies to international students in two Master's programmes (General Medicine and Dentistry). Faculty provides the organisation of specialisation training for general medicine and doctors of dentistry in basic disciplines. In 15 study programmes, it enables doctoral studies for graduates of Master's degree programmes.

The MU Faculty of Medicine is located in the Bohunice University Campus, which also includes a large University Campus Library and a new building of the MU Faculty of Medicine Simulation Centre (SIMU). Simulation and virtual worlds have become common in teaching at FM MU. SIMU is equipped similarly to a real hospital: heliport, operating theatres, intensive care units, medical technology and simulators. It provides a completely new perspective on teaching General and Dental Medicine.

A number of related studies have aimed to determine the extent of pressure area and pressure ulcer pain and explore the role of pain as a predictor of Category ≥2 pressure ulcers in acute hospital and community populations.

Workshop 7: Pressure ulcer prevention in younger population

The prevention of pressure injuries in premature babies, newborns, infants, and other pediatric ages is a translational reality among all paediatric hospitals that welcome highly complex patients. Prevention starts from the reception and must follow the child in his / her path in the operating room, in intensive and sub-intensive care, in the specialist hospitalization ward until discharge, home caring and follow-up. Prevention manoeuvres require attention to any associated comorbidities and to the particular fragility of the skin. Offloading includes a direct and indirect skin contact protection strategy that uses multilayer polyurethane foams and fluidized positioners, all of different sizes and adaptable to early life. Each medical therapeutic device must be positioned beyond the limits of the body surface and the contact sections must be protected to avoid MDRPU: the materials used must often be cut and adapted to measure to achieve better compliance.
